Drones for Avocados

Avocado farmers from Queensland are trialing thermal imaging and drones to calculate how much water their trees are losing through transpiration. They use thermal imaging to fly above the crops and take photos. The imaging picks up the hot spots by taking the temperature of the trees. From these images, the farmers can determine the exact amount of water they need. This helps save water by putting it where it is most needed. Nearby macadamia farms are also trialing the technology.

Grocery Delivery

Google Wing Drones have started delivering groceries on the Gold Coast. The drones will pick up the groceries from the Coles car park before winging them off to people in Ormeau and Ormeau Hills in Queensland.

The Coles partnership first commenced in March in Canberra, where they trialed parcel delivery to the folks of Canberra. Customers order via an app, and before you know it, your milk and bread are airborne and at your front door!

First Flying Car Race?

The salt plains of South Australia hosted what is said to be the first-ever flying car race in May this year.

Alauda Aeronautics (vehicle manufacturer) has been experimenting with large drones for the last 18 months; tests include a 100 km/hour race.

These remote-controlled aircraft cannot transport people yet, but Airspeeders hopes to launch a Grand Prix in 2024 with people in the driver's seat. They hope their trials will "hasten the arrival of the electric flying cars that we have been promised in contemporary culture for generations".

Sustainable Aviation Fuel (SAF) council

In the recent Federal budget, the government has committed to establishing a Sustainable Aviation Fuel Council. The council will support new technologies and innovative ways to reduce aviation emissions. A \$139.9 million investment over three years will also provide funding upgrades for Hobart airport, border facilities in Newcastle, and western Sydney's international airports.

It is a big step towards reducing carbon emissions in Australia. Qantas has said it will invest \$50K to help set up the council and claims that by 2050, it hopes to get 60% of its fuel from SAF, with a short-term goal of 10 percent by 2030.



Artemis Heads for the Moon!

NASA launched the rocket Artemis on the 15th November, 50 years after the final Apollo Moon Mission. The rocket contained three test dummies. In three weeks the rocket will propel an empty crew capsule into orbit around the moon. The capsule will arrive back on Earth in December, splashing down in the Pacific Ocean. Artemis is named after the Greek goddess of the hunt.

Relaxed Dress Code for Everyone

Virgin Atlantic recently announced that crew, pilots, and ground staff can now wear uniforms they feel most comfortable in. Gone are the expectations that males and females wear one type of uniform. Fashion icon Vivienne Westwood designed the red skirt suit or burgundy trousers after the airline announced its gender identity policy. Pronoun badges will also be available for staff to wear. Virgin also plans to commence mandatory inclusivity training for all its staff.

Not long after Virgin Atlantic's announcement British Airways followed suit and flight staff are now allowed to wear mascara, false eyelashes, and earrings regardless of their gender identity. Accessories such as handbags and nail polish are also included in the refreshed dress-code.

Virgin has just announced Pride Flights for Sydney's 2023 Mardi Gras in February to celebrate World Pride Day. Organisers expect it to be the most significant event for international tourism in Australia since Sydney held the Olympics in 2000! The flights will include a pre-flight party and entertainment.

Join us on the 11th of November as we remember those who lost their lives in wars here and overseas. Remembrance Day (or Armistice Day) is a day when we continue to hope for peace. Australian journalist Edward George Honey wrote a letter to a London newspaper in May 1919, suggesting the minute of silence to remember those that had fallen. Regulation Updates



Safety Management Systems (SMS) – (implementation plan) 2 December 2022

Safety Management is the principles, frameworks, and processes your operations apply to help prevent accidents and injuries and minimise risk. The forming of a safety management system (SMS) ensures that the skies remain safe. Once you have set up your SMS in accordance with the CASA guidelines, you will need to educate your staff. This can be done using internal or external training providers.

If you are a Part 119 air transport and relevant Part 138 aerial work operator, you must:

- provide an implementation plan by <u>2</u>
 December 2022
- provide your full documentation by <u>3 June</u>
 2024
- be ready to start by 1 December 2024.

Regulation Updates (cont)

To help you develop your documents, read <u>AC 119-01</u> <u>Safety management systems</u> for air transport operations. This AC is equally useful to develop an SMS for an aerial work operation. This Month in Aviation History,







3 November 1926 (USA) — Captain Charles Lindbergh jumps from his disabled aeroplane during a night airmail flight. This is the fourth time he has had to use his parachute to save his life. 5-7 November 1938 (Egypt/Australia) — Kellett, Gaine, Combe, and Gray, Great Britain, set a world distance record of 7,158.440 miles, from Ismailia, Egypt, to Darwin, Australia. (Vickers Wellesley, Bristol Pegasus engine)

13 November 1907 (France) — France's first piloted helicopter

<u>13 November 1907 (France)</u> — France's first piloted helicopter rises vertically in free flight. Built by Paul Cornu, it's powered by a 24-hp Antoinette engine driving two motors.

14 November 1966 (Antarctica) — A Lockheed C-141

"Starlifter" became the first jet aircraft to land in Antarctica.

<u>26 November 1939 (England)</u> — British Overseas Airways Corporation (BOAC) is established through the amalgamation of Imperial Airways and British Airways.

30 November 1784 (England) — Jean-Pierre Blanchard makes the first scientific observations from above the earth in a hydrogen balloon over London.
